Through the voices of vivid characters, witty and moving dialogue, and poetically drawn landscapes and seascapes, Margaret Duley created a Newfoundland stage upon which she explored existential and universal questions. Duley won international recognition with four novels, and though lauded by leading critics abroad, her appreciation at home was comparatively muted. In her native St. John's, Duley's strong female protagonists prompted speculation and gossip about her own life as a single, questioning woman. Skillfully interwoven with historical events, including the devastating impact of the first World War, the women's suffrage movement, the Depression, the loss of Newfoundland's self-government, and Confederation with Canada, **Extraordinary Passages** explores the influence of these critical times on Duley's life and writing. Within these pages, Margaret Duley is freed from flattened descriptions of her as a wealthy jeweller's daughter, unearthing the origins of her lifelong search for a fairer society and her deep appreciation for her island home. Disillusioned with Christian institutions that had justified war and entrapped women, she sought new answers at home and abroad in her search for spirituality, feminism, and anti-militarism.

Margot I. Duley is an historian and Margaret's niece. Reflecting on personal knowledge, novels, letters, and a wide array of other sources, Margot I. Duley draws a lively portrait of the brilliant, complex and indomitable woman regarded as a precursor to modern feminist writers.

Searching for the Origins of the Portuguese Waltzes is a collection of narratives depicting a six-year quest to discover the roots of a piece of traditional music played in St. John's, Newfoundland: the Portuguese Waltzes. Through interviews, research, and observations, author Richard Simas explores the relationship between Portuguese bacalhoeiros (cod fishermen) and the population of St. John's during the recent cod-fishing era (approximately 1950 to 1980). Memory, and its varying interpretation among different communities, is a major underlying theme. Above all, though, this is a book about music, shared, invented, and improvised, underscoring the power of melody to capture and conserve emotional memory across the Atlantic.




Newfoundland's 17th & 18th Century Judicature: the path to 1792 and the role of the law officers of the Crown (2 volumes)

These volumes trace the development of the rule of law in Newfoundland in the 17th and 18th century from the Western Charter and its antecedents through to the emergence of a Supreme Court of appellate and original inherent jurisdiction in 1792. They explain the evolution of the legal environment in which Newfoundland's early Chief Justices worked and carried out their duties in interpreting and applying the law to the issues which litigants, high and low, brought before them. They also highlight the role played by the Law Officers of the Crown in advancing legal institutions in Newfoundland, a role previously either undervalued or overlooked.




And Then Some: collected columns

Veteran Journalist Bob Wakeham satirizes, skewers and salutes in this retrospective work, a selection of political and cultural commentaries spanning 18 years. Selected and edited by Bob Wakeham and writer and literacy advocate Frances Ennis, the columns offer the perfect blend of a time capsule of Newfoundland and Labrador popular discourse, and a love letter to political satire.

Wakeham's sharp wit and piercing insight are leveled at everything from the early days of the Muskrat Falls hydroelectric development and Don Cherry's ejection from Hockey Night in Canada, to every premier since Joey Smallwood and what Wakeham labeled the "Stunned Arses Awards". But for every punch thrown, there's a tender tribute to a lost colleague, an unflinching examination of the author's own life, or a reflective look at societal issues.




These Englishmen Who Died for France: 1st July, 1916: the bloodiest day in British history

Englishmen, Scotsmen, Irishmen, Welshmen, Canadians, South Africans, Australians, New Zealanders - many soldiers from Great Britain and the Commonwealth volunteered in 1916 to attack on the front in Picardy, a much heavier involvement than in the previous years of the First World War. On 1st July 1916, more than 20,000 of them lost their lives on the battlefield of the Somme, coming to the aid of a French army exhausted by Verdun. It is the deadliest day in British history and the recognition of this sacrifice was then - and has remained since - relatively muted in France, as this grim anniversary is celebrated across the Channel, illustrating how much national collective memories differ. Comparing French and English archives to try to understand why and how so many men died, Jean-Michel Steg gives this episode its central place in the memory of the Great War.




Ocean: a history of the Atlantic before Columbus

A dazzling and ambitious history of the pre-Columbian Atlantic seas, Ocean is a story that begins with the formation of the mid-Atlantic ridge some 200 million years ago and ends with the Castilian conquest of the Canary Islands in the fifteenth century, providing a template for the methods used by the Spanish in their colonization of the New World. John Haywood eloquently argues that the perception of Atlantic history beginning with the first voyage of the celebrated Genoese navigator Christopher Columbus is a mistaken one, and that the seafaring and shipbuilding skills that enabled European global exploration and expansion did not arrive fully formed in the fifteenth century, but instead were learned over centuries and millennia in the Atlantic and its peripheral seas. The pre-Columbian history of the Atlantic is the story of how Europeans learned to master the oceans. This story is, therefore, key to understanding why it was Europeans, and not any of the world's other seafaring peoples, who "discovered" the world. Informed by the author's extensive travels in and around the Atlantic Ocean, crossing Newfoundland's Grand Banks, the Sea of Darkness, and the weed-covered Sargasso Sea to make landfall at locations as diverse as Vinland, Greenland, the Faroes, and the Cape Verde Islands, and populated by a heterogeneous and multi-ethnic cast of seafarers, fishermen, monks, merchants, and dreamers, Ocean is an in-depth history of a neglected subject, fusing geology, geography, mythology developing maritime technologies, and the early history of exploration to narrate an enthralling and intriguing story—one which lies at the very heart of Europe's modern history and its relationship with the rest of the world.



Moved by a powerful call from her ancestors, Ellen Hunt's work has taken her to burial sites ranging from Nova Scotia's South Shore to Cape Breton. This memoir chronicles her childhood growing up in a Mi'kmaw community in Newfoundland and her activist work through to the present day. Ellen also shares the many challenges she has faced – from indifferent politicians to antagonistic locals.

This memoir incorporates stories about the long Mi'kmaw history of the sites Ellen has identified and the teachings of her Mi'kmaw ancestors which have shaped her life and her work.




Aviation's Holy Grail: the first crossing of the Atlantic by air

In 1919, seven airplanes and one airship were part of the quest to be the first to cross the Atlantic Ocean by air - the Holy Grail of aviation at that time. Their departure point - the island of Newfoundland. Within a month, in the spring of that year, three planes were forced down into the icy waters of the North Atlantic, another crashed on take-off (twice), a fifth quit the race altogether, and a blimp broke her moorings and drifted unmanned out over the Atlantic, never to be seen again. One American and one British plane succeeded in crossing. Both, but for different reasons, could claim they won the race.



This book was inspired by the writer's experiences of growing up in Northern Bay during the 1960's and 1970's, her family's generational history of living in the North Shore communities of Northern Bay, Western Bay, and Gull Island, and the stories that were told by her parents, grandparents, and community elders. Although many traditions and celebrations are not held on the same scale they once were, there continues to be pride and regard for maintaining many of them. To that end, motivation in capturing stories, lore, and ballads from the North Shore and Grates Cove and including them in a book comes from the writer's belief in the importance of documenting, preserving, and celebrating local history, traditions, and cultural ways of living so that future generations will remember them.




Feministing in Political Science

Focusing on the discipline of political science, this collection examines what is at stake in contesting the boundaries of the contemporary university. As the study of politics and political life, the mainstream of the discipline has examined power in the institutions and processes of government. But if the personal is political, political science is about much more than what happens in those institutions. This collection draws together personal essays, pedagogical interventions, dialogues, and original research to reflect on how "feministing" as an orientation and as an analytic can centre experiential knowledge and reshape our understandings of political science. Collectively, these contributions lay bare the ways that power moves in and through the academy, naming the impacts on those who are most structurally precarious, all while pointing to potential futures made possible by refusal, solidarity, and hope.



Bluecoat: the remarkable journey of native-born Newfoundlander Major General Sir Henry Pynn from Musquito Cove in Newfoundland to defender of Portugal in the Napoleonic Wars

Henry Pynn had distinguished military service during the Peninsular War, demonstrating remarkable resilience and leadership in several critical engagements. Initially, he served with the 82nd Regiment of Foot, participating in the early battles at Rolica and Vimeiro, where he contributed to British successes against the French forces. After his tenure with the 82nd Regiment, Pynn joined the reorganized Portuguese Army, aligning himself with local efforts to resist French occupation. In this capacity, he played a vital role in several crucial battles, including Busaco, where he fought to defend against French advances, and Fuentes de Oñoro, where he engaged in fierce combat to secure a strategic victory. Pynn's service continued through several vital conflicts, including the sieges and battles at Badajoz and Vitoria, which were pivotal in weakening French control in the region. He also fought through the challenging terrains of the Pyrenees and participated in the engagements at Orthez. His military contributions culminated at the Battle of Toulouse in April 1814, marking the conclusion of his active combat during the war and contributing to the eventual defeat of Napoleon's forces on the Iberian Peninsula. Throughout his service, Henry Pynn exhibited commitment and valor, earning recognition and respect for his contributions to the military efforts of both British and Portuguese forces against the French occupation.



"We Are in Charge Here": Inuit self-government and the Nunatsiavut Assembly



Powerful, innovative Indigenous self-governance regimes are increasingly important players in Canadian politics, but little academic work has been done on their structure, operation, and effectiveness. "We Are In Charge Here" examines the central institution of the most populous Indigenous self-governance regime in Canada, the elected Assembly of the Nunatsiavut Government.

Nunatsiavut – "our beautiful land" in Inuktitut – was established in 2006 by a modern treaty between the Labrador Inuit and the Canadian state. Graham White offers a thorough observation of the Assembly, based on interviews with Assembly members and others involved in Nunatsiavut politics, observation of Assembly sessions, and a review of official documents, in order to provide a comprehensive picture of the Assembly, its members, and its operations. The book examines the Assembly's effectiveness in performing traditional legislative functions such as representation, policy making, and accountability. It addresses key concerns including executive-legislative power relations, Inuit influence on Assembly operations, and the Assembly's role in realizing self-government.

Illuminating the intersection of Indigenous self-governance approaches and Western institutions, **"We Are In Charge Here"** will be of interest to political leaders, legislative officials, and academics concerned with the design and on-the-ground functioning of Indigenous self-government.




Ed Hand: helping people one hand at a time






Arctic Predator: the crimes of Edward Horne against children in Canada's North




Sea Sick: a stained glass poem
